Acquisition Policy

- **DoD Directive 5000.1:** The Defense Acquisition System, May 12, 2003 – EVM is not addressed
- **DoD Instruction 5000.2:** Operation of the Defense Acquisition System, May 12, 2003 – EVMS is a Regulatory Information Requirement (Table E3.T2)
- **Defense Acquisition Guidebook:**
 - Former 5000.2-R remains in effect as an “interim guidebook” (dated October 30, 2002) until replaced
 - Not mandatory, but should be used for best practices, lessons learned, and expectations
 - New guidebook under development – EVM is included (DFARS also being updated)
 - Electronic publication expected in Spring time frame

Goal: To transform the Defense Department's business practices

DoD EVM Activities

- **Ongoing Activities:**
 - Use of EVM information by OSD; DAMIR EV pilot
 - Interface with services, intel agencies, OMB, industry, associations
- **International Activities:**
 - Renewing participation in IPMC
 - Extending MOU with Australia and Canada
- **Improvement Activities:**
 - EVM web site - EVM CoP on ACC
 - EVM training
 - WBS handbook (MIL-HNBK 881)

OSD putting more focus on EVM and plans to stay engaged

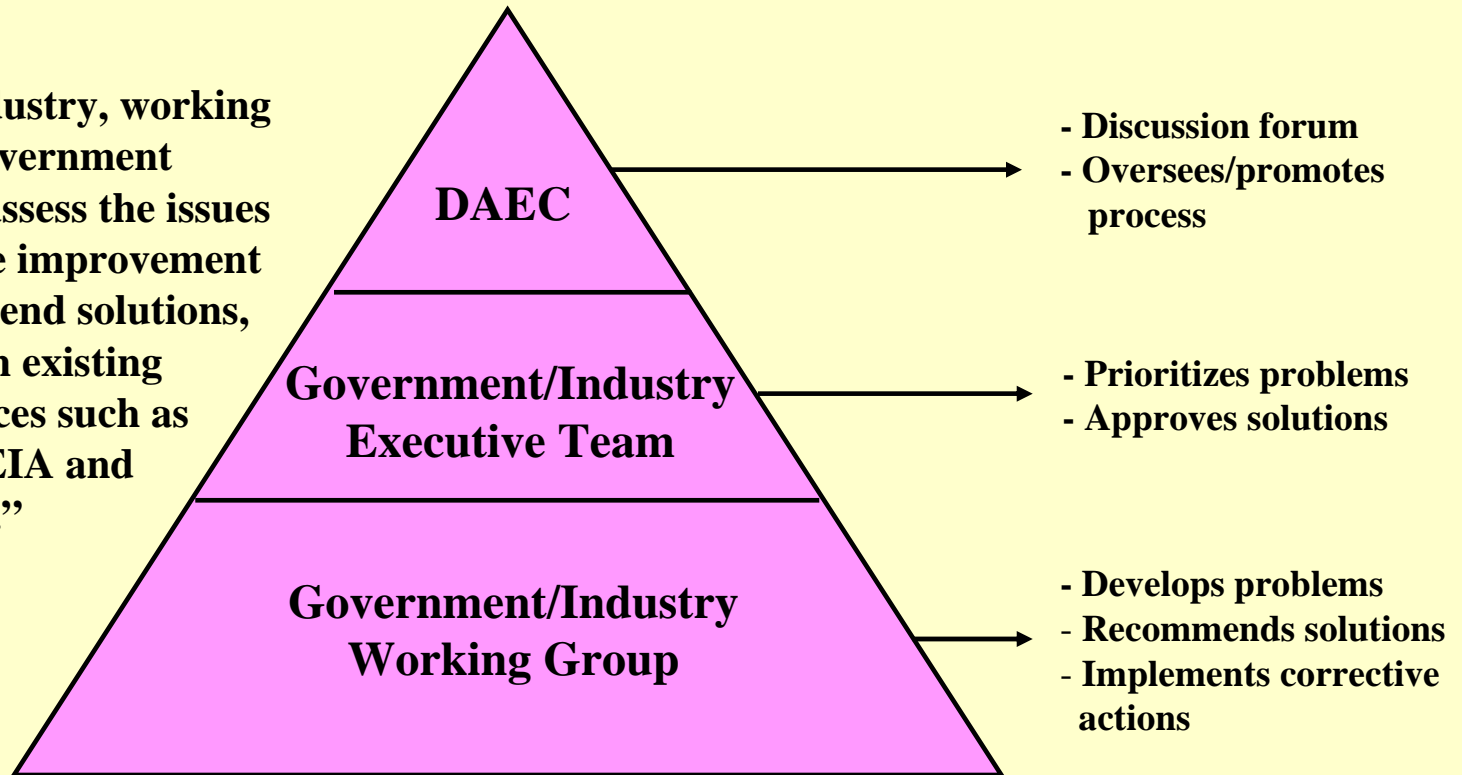
DoD EVM Activities

- **Improvement Activities (Cont.):**
 - EVM Implementation Guide
 - DoD Integrated Baseline Review Manual
 - Policy on EVMS on FFP contracts
 - Performance reporting - CPR, C/SSR
 - New avenues for communication, problem resolution
