Audrey S. Brady has more than twenty-five years' experience in aerospace with a solid technical foundation, strengthened by operations, supply chain, and program management leadership, as well as proven results for military and commercial customers.

Audrey currently serves as the Vice President of F-35 Global Sustainment with responsibility for leading the teams who support and deliver overall F-35 mission readiness for the warfighter. Prior to this role, Audrey served as the Vice President of F-35 Training & Logistics for Lockheed Martin Rotary and Mission Systems (RMS). In this role, she was responsible for leading all aspects of development, production and sustainment for F-35 training products that are currently in use by 14 customers at 21 operational bases worldwide.

Previously, Audrey served as the Vice President of Sikorsky Commercial Systems and Services for Lockheed Martin's RMS. She was responsible for the overall strategic leadership for all aspects of the Sikorsky commercial market segment including the entire lifecycle in market assessment, product development, engineering design,

sales and marketing, manufacturing and delivery, FAA certifications, aftermarket services including performance-based logistics contracts, government affairs and customer relationships.

Earlier in her career, Audrey served as the general manager of Sikorsky's Coatesville, Pennsylvania Operations responsible for operational execution including final assembly and flight operations for S-92®, S-76®, CMHP, S-70i and the completion center for all commercial aircraft. She was responsible for driving engagement, accountability and compliance throughout the organization; ensuring excellence in execution; and enhancing operational and financial performance.

Prior to assuming the general manager position, Audrey was appointed director of the S-92 program responsible for the development and execution of the S-92 product line which serves as the baseline for the presidential helicopter known as the VH-92, establishing and meeting all financial, schedule, and technical requirements.

Audrey has also served as director of Sikorsky Connecticut Final Assembly and Flight Operations where she partnered with the Defense Contract Management

Agency (DCMA) and Government Flight Representative (GFR) to produce and deliver Black Hawk and Naval Hawk aircraft to the U.S. military and multiple foreign customers.

Beginning her career as an aero-thermal engineer after graduate school at Pratt & Whitney in 1996, Audrey has held positions of increasing responsibility in engineering, operations and corporate supply chain. One of her engineering roles included working on the exhaust nozzle for the F-35 engine.

Audrey is a recognized leader in talent development and diversity and inclusion where she proactively invests significant time coaching and developing next generation leaders. She makes it a priority volunteering to inspire students to pursue careers in the Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM).

Audrey holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Mathematics and Mechanical Engineering from Trinity College, a Master of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering from Stanford University and a Master of Business Administration from Carnegie Mellon University. She also obtained her private helicopter pilot's license in February, 2017.

Lt. Gen. Tom D. Miller is the Commander of the Air Force Sustainment Center,

Air Force Materiel Command, Tinker Air Force Base, Oklahoma. As the AFSC Commander, he leads 40,000 total force Airmen at 26 locations around the globe,

comprised of three air logistics complexes which are the Air Force's depots, three air base wings that provide installation support, and two supply chain wings providing global supply chain support.

He has served in a variety of leadership positions and has commanded maintenance squadrons in the U.S. and

Iraq, a maintenance group in Afghanistan, a nuclear wing, an Air Logistics Complex, and has served on the Air Staff and the Joint Staff. Prior to his current position, Lt. Gen. Miller was the Director of Logistics, Engineering, and Force Protection for Air Combat Command.

GEN STEVE LYONS, USA (RET)

Senior Fellow, Institute for Defense and Business, The University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill
Senior Mentor, National Defense University

General Steve Lyons retired from the U.S. Army in 2021 after over 38

years of service culminating as the 13th commander of US Transportation Command (TRANSCOM). TRANSCOM is one of 11 DoD combatant commands responsible for deploying and sustaining military forces globally, providing humanitarian assistance, and integrating the Department's multibillion-dollar joint deployment and distribution enterprise.

A native of Rensselaer New York, General Lyons was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the U.S. Army upon graduation from Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT) in 1983. He began his career in Germany during the Cold War and subsequently held a wide range of leadership assignments that included command of troops at every level including multiple combat deployments such as Panama, Bosnia-Herzegovina, Iraq, Afghanistan. As a battalion commander

in 2003, he led more than 1,200 Soldiers as part of the 3rd Infantry Division ground assault to liberate Baghdad. He subsequently spent more than 40 months deployed to the U.S. Central Command area of responsibility in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom and Operation Enduring Freedom, Afghanistan. He has over nine years of experience in joint assignments.

General Lyons' flag officer assignments include the Afghanistan International Security Assistance Force (ISAF) C/J-4 (2009-2011), Headquarters Department of the Army Staff, Commander 8th Theater Sustainment Command (Indo-Pacific), Commander U.S. Army Combined Arms Sustainment Command, Deputy Commander TRANSCOM, and Joint Staff Director of Logistics (J4). As TRANSCOM commander he oversaw the largest noncombatant evacuation airlift operation in U.S. history resulting in the successful evacuation of 124,000 Afghans within two weeks' time.

He holds two masters degrees, one from the Naval Postgraduate School in Logistics Management; and the second from the Industrial College of the Armed Forces in National Resource Strategy.

His awards include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Bronze Star, and the Master Parachutist Badge. He is the recipient of the National Defense Transportation Association 2021 distinguished leader award and has been inducted into the Hall of Fame at the Naval Postgraduate School and U.S. Army Materiel Command.

Upon retirement he and Maureen, his wife of 32 years, settled in Davidson, North Carolina. He is currently a senior fellow for the Institute for Defense and Business at UNC Chapel Hill and senior mentor for the National Defense University Capstone, Keystone, and Pinnacle programs.

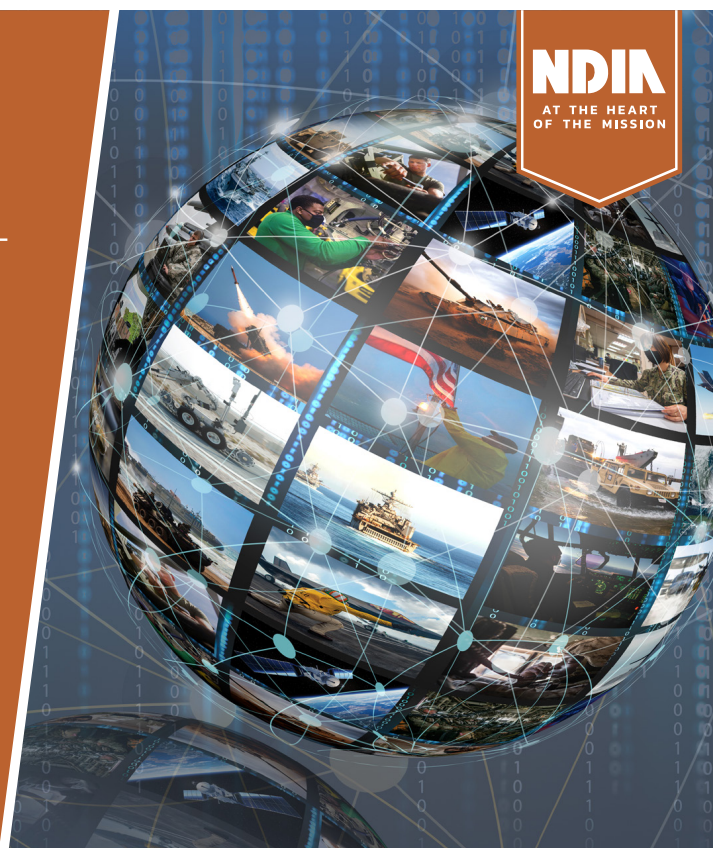

GEN GUSTAVE PERNA, USA (RET)

Former Chief Operating Officer of the Federal COVID-19 Response for Vaccine and Therapeutics

General Gustave Perna distinguished himself over the course of 40 years of exceptional service to the U.S. Government and the Department of Defense, culminating as Chief Operating Officer of the nation's response to the COVID-19 pandemic. In this position, General Perna developed the strategy and oversaw the execution of the logistical support for the federal government's

distribution of the vaccines developed to help battle the COVID-19 pandemic. Prior to this, he served as the Chief Operating Officer of Operation Warp Speed, an effort to develop and produce an effective COVID-19 vaccine. General Perna's efforts were critical and highly effective in helping our nation through one of its most challenging times in modern history.

General Perna's vast logistics experience, relentless drive and highly effective leadership during this period, as well as throughout multiple other highly demanding assignments during his esteemed military career, has ensured a strong national defense and provided enduring benefits for our nation.

In recognition of his substantial contribution to the Department of Defense in the area of integrated logistics support engineering and its implementation in maintenance and product support, the National Defense Industrial Association presents its 2021 Edward M. Greer Award to Major General H. Brent Baker Sr., USAF (Ret).

Maj Gen Baker has influenced logistics on a personal as well as institutional level throughout his career. His notable contribution is marked by his having mentored a generation of airmen and DoD leaders, as well as civilian counterparts, on how to work with logistics effectively.
